DORSET WASTE PRTNERSHIP (DWP)

New bin collection service coming to more households

Around 50,000 Dorset households will shortly receive information about changes to their bin collections.

The Recycle for Dorset collection service will start from Monday 13 October in Weymouth and Portland and part of West Dorset including Abbotsbury, Chickerell, Maiden Newton, Martinstown, Sherborne and Yetminster.

The service is already used by 135,000 Dorset households, leading to recycling rates doubling in some areas.

The Dorset Waste Partnership (DWP) will be posting a letter and leaflet to all households in this area over the next three weeks.

Residents who think the service shown in their leaflet will not meet their specific needs should contact the DWP online or by phone no later than Thursday 19 June to request different containers or help moving their bins.

Households also have until 19 June to pay for a fortnightly garden waste collection starting in October. Around 30,000 Dorset households have already paid for the optional service.

The quickest way to request changes or to pay for the garden waste collection is online at www.dorsetforyou.com/recyclefordorset

The Recycle for Dorset service lets residents recycle more than before, including plastic bottles, pots, tubs and trays.

Food waste will be collected weekly using a 23-litre lockable bin and a 7-litre kitchen caddy. Recycling will be collected fortnightly using a larger wheelie bin and residents' existing box, which will be for glass only. Rubbish will be collected fortnightly in a smaller wheelie bin.

The DWP will reuse existing containers where possible. Weymouth and Portland residents who have a green wheelie bin for rubbish will keep it to use it as their recycling bin from October.

Properties in Weymouth and Portland with brown wheelie bins for cardboard and food waste will have them replaced with the smaller, lockable food bin, as cardboard will go in their recycling bin from October. People who already have a smaller food bin will keep it.

West Dorset residents who already have a food waste collection will reuse their containers. If residents' containers are missing they should contact the DWP online or by phone before 19 June so replacements can be delivered by October.

Phone lines are expected to be busy, so residents are advised to go online if they can. A web chat service is also available to help with any queries.

Thirteen public roadshows are being held during May and June for residents to see the new bins and speak to DWP officers. Details are included in the letters and can be found at www.dorsetforyou.com/recyclingevents

Steve Burdis, Director of the Dorset Waste Partnership, said:

"This is our fourth phase of rolling out the 'recycle for Dorset' service, having already introduced it to 135,000 households. The results so far have been excellent, with big increases in recycling, savings on waste costs and high levels of customer satisfaction.

"We are writing to people now to explain the new service and give them a chance to find out more and contact us before 19 June about their household's specific needs if necessary.

"As with any change on this scale, it can take a little time to get used to. However, this can be overcome with early communications, so I would encourage all residents to read their information, check our website and come to a roadshow to see how it will work for them."

Repairs start on storm-damaged roads

Dorset County Council has started to repair roads that were ravaged by the winter storms.

And the council will be using £5.8m from the Government's emergency fund to support this programme.

The highways team continually surveys the county's roads, checking for potholes and other defects that affect road users, many of which have been reported by local residents. This information is used to plan the maintenance schedule.

This programme of works has been structured so that the machinery and the teams' time can be used in the most efficient way possible. They will be mending roads that have been designated as high priority and that are located nearby. The teams will then move to another area. They will continue in this way across the county.

In the meantime other highways teams will be temporarily repairing potholes to ensure that roads that are in the maintenance plan remain safe for road users.

Permanent pothole and road defect repair will also continue on roads that are in a good overall condition.

Andrew Martin, head of highways, said:

"It has been a complicated process, prioritising roads and then planning the route of the teams to use the Government's money in the best way possible.

"We are repairing long sections of A and B roads, together with shorter, trickier C and D roads. The lower class roads are strategically important for Dorset, but they often give us difficult logistic problems with the size of the machinery that we use.

"The Government want us to use this emergency fund by the summer holidays. This may mean that we only have a short-time to inform local residents that this is happening in their area – so please be patient, we will do our best to keep people up-to-date."

Temporary and more permanent signs will explain to road users what is happening in specific areas. These may include advisory speed limits when the surface is in a poor condition.

Cllr Peter Finney, Cabinet member for environment and economy, said:

"It's important for us to maintain Dorset roads for the benefit of the economy. The tight deadline the Government has given us means that we have to work quickly to take advantage of this fund.

"The county council will continue to bid for more funding from the Government to help address the funding gap between what we need and what we have received.

"As always I would caution drivers to adapt their driving to the conditions of the road and take care on roads that have deteriorated."

On-street parking panel says schemes should meet local need

A review of on-street parking schemes across Dorset has agreed that one size doesn't fit all.

A policy development panel set up by Dorset County Council examined the issue following feedback from towns that were being considered for the scheme.

And now a new set of criteria will be used to consider whether on-street parking is right for an area, on a case-by-case basis.

The county council is responsible for all public roads, streets and pavements, except for the major trunk roads that are managed by the Highways Agency. On-street parking schemes can help to reduce congestion and increase the number of spaces available for visitors in busy town centres.

The cross-party panel of councillors established that there were benefits from well designed schemes in appropriate locations.

But they have agreed a number of principles for the county council to use when looking to apply on-street pay and display parking in a particular area.

The main condition is that paying for parking on the street will be used only when there is a clearly defined problem to solve. This could be traffic congestion, or issues with the availability of parking in the town.

Another key step is to make sure that local communities and councils are involved in the process, and that their needs and concerns are met by the scheme.

Cllr Bill Trite, chairman of the policy development panel, said:

"On-street pay and display will not be introduced purely as a source of income for the council. There must be a distinct problem to solve, where pay and display would be an appropriate solution.

"To produce a scheme that solves a local issue, we need to understand local needs, conditions and concerns. One size does not fit all."

Each scheme will be reviewed after a year to make sure it has achieved the desired result. Alterations can be made at this stage to fine tune the scheme.

Towns will now be evaluated and prioritised using this new set of criteria.

Great Dorset Beach Clean 2014 results

An incredible 692 people took part in the 26th Great Dorset Beach Clean on 27 April, filling 851 bags with rubbish from 25 beaches across the county.

The annual blitz on the beaches is organised by Dorset County Council's coastal ranger team. The number of bags collected this year is 23 per cent more than during 2013's Spring Beach Clean, and 65 per cent more than 2012's.

Families, individuals, community groups and local businesses joined forces to clear the beaches ready for the summer. A beachmaster was on hand at each location to give out rubbish bags, gloves and instructions. Volunteers were rewarded for their efforts with discounted refreshments at several local cafés, pubs and restaurants. There were a few odd items found amongst the everyday litter. These included a big chunks of metal and a rather crushed bicycle, an iron girder, a burnt-out mattress, a plastic washing basket and a bath tub.

Jenny Penney, coordinator of the Great Dorset Beach Clean, said: "I'm overwhelmed with this year's response by volunteers. It's tremendous that so many people gave their time to help to clean up the beaches along the coastline. I would like to thank everyone for coming, despite some appalling weather, and for their fantastic efforts on the day. A special thanks also to our sponsors the Jurassic Coast Trust and Virador."

Dorset County Council Cabinet member for environment and the economy, Peter Finney added: "After the horrendous storms that hit our beaches over the winter the beach clean efforts of local people were even more appreciated than usual. Every bag removed from a beach will help restore our globally-important coastline to its full glory, for wildlife and people to enjoy this summer."

Public can have their say on pharmacy services

Health services in Dorset are seeking people's views about using local pharmacies.

Public Health Dorset, working with NHS Dorset Clinical Commissioning Group and NHS England, is carrying out a Pharmaceutical Needs Assessment to pull together the needs of local people. The survey, to find out where people currently use pharmacy services, what they use them for, and why they use a particular pharmacy as well as how far people travel to get to a pharmacy, will be key to gathering this information.

Once completed, the Pharmaceutical Needs Assessment will plot out existing pharmacy and dispensary services across Dorset and provide details of what pharmacy services local people use, how they like to use those services, how frequently they use them, and how far they usually travel to their preferred pharmacy.

Results of the Pharmaceutical Needs Assessment will be used by NHS England when they make decisions about pharmacy services in the future.

Jane Horne, Consultant at Public Health Dorset, said: "This is a vital way of discovering how pharmacy services can suit the needs of local people. It will find any gaps in services and highlight where pharmacies should be going in the future and what services they provide. We're looking for views from anyone whether they use pharmacies regularly or occasionally."

Time for a cut

With summer just around the corner, and the mild and wet spring causing rapid growth, Dorset County Council is gearing up to keep roadside verges in top condition..

And the council's Cabinet has agreed to provide an extra £50,000 to increase the number of cuts where they can.

Currently, in towns, verges are cut six times a year between March and November and in rural areas they are cut twice, between April and October. However the wet and mild summers have encouraged more plant growth.

Cllr Peter Finney, Cabinet member of environment and the economy, said:

"We have to balance timing the cuts with keeping verges tidy and safe for road users. In our towns a neater edge is preferred, where on rural roads we can encourage a more natural approach.

"There is a long term plan to form a 'Living Verges' partnership - working with the Dorset Wildlife Trust, parish and town councils to change the way highway vegetation is managed. We want to make it make it both more environmentally friendly and financially sustainable, but in the meantime the Cabinet recognise that we need to do more to respond to the concerns of communities."

The Living Verges partnership will trial new ways of managing roadside plants and flowers including using clippings for animal feed or as fuel for renewable energy.

Community involvement is also part of the plan with better ways for responding to queries and complaints.

Dorset Waste Partnership – April 2014

Reduction in recycling brink bank sites

The Dorset Waste Partnership (DWP) will reduce its network of recycling banks due to improved opportunities for residents to recycle at home, the increasing costs of maintaining banks and problems with trade abuse and fly-tipping.

The DWP has decided to remove the majority of its 'bring' banks as part of its ongoing savings programme. Identified banks will be removed from June 2014, starting in areas where the new 'recycle for Dorset' collection service is in use.

A number of well-used sites will be retained as well as banks for materials that cannot be collected at the kerbside, such as Tetra-Pak cartons, aluminium foil and textiles.

At some sites, banks for tins and cans have already been combined with banks for plastic bottles as separate banks are no longer needed.

The 140 bring bank sites in Dorset cost more than £115,000 to maintain last year. Use of bring banks has dropped significantly since the 'recycle for Dorset' service started in October 2012.

Using the 'recycle for Dorset' service, residents can recycle: paper and cardboard; plastic bottles, pots, tubs and trays; tins, cans and aerosols; glass bottles and jars; and batteries.
